How Safe Is My Identity?



Identify theft occurs when a person takes another person's identifying information to commit fraud.

What does a criminal do with my personal information?

Once a criminal has the information they need they could:

- X Apply for a credit card in your name
- ✗ Open a bank or building society account in your name
- ✗ Apply for other financial services in your name
- ✗ Run up debts e.g. use your credit/debit card details to make purchase or obtain a loan in your name
- ★ Apply for any benefits in your name e.g. housing benefit, new tax credits, income support, job seeker's allowance, child benefit.
- X Apply for a driving licence in your name
- X Register a vehicle in your name
- X Apply for a job/employment in your name
- X Apply for a passport in your name
- ★ Apply for a mobile phone contract in your name.*

Online

- ✓ When creating a password, avoid using obvious passwords such as your name and birthdates. Use a combination of random words that only have meaning to you.
- ✓ Avoid using the same password on multiple accounts
- ✓ Change your password regularly.
- ✓ Do not save passwords to your computer.

At home

- ✓ Secure personal information in a lockable filing cabinet or safe.
- Before discarding old bills or expired cards, ensure any identifying information is removed. Consider a home paper shredder.
- ✓ Lock your letterbox.

General

- ✓ Avoid providing personal information by phone, mail or online and know who you are dealing with before giving out personal information.
- ✓ Check transactions on your banking and credit card accounts regularly to monitor for potential fraudulent transactions.
- ✓ Follow up mail that doesn't arrive on time.
- ✓ If you lose your wallet or purse, notify your bank immediately to lock your accounts.
- ✓ Don't carry your PIN number in your wallet.
- ✓ Avoid carrying documents such as your passport or birth certificate unless absolutely necessary.
